The surround to the Uppingham in Bloom garden has been improved and seeded which will make the area more 'park like' than before.

The skate parks popularity has created a new issue with an increased volume of litter being created. In the next few weeks some additional bins will be installed and we'd ask that these be used and if full, users take their litter home or to another nearby bin.

The positive feedback we have received about the new pathways has meant we are considering how we can link and create more new paths on Tod's Piece so the park can be used all year around. Any ideas and views would be welcome from residents and Tod's Piece users to help shape our plans.

YOUR LOCAL POLICE SUPPORT

CURRENT LOCAL PRIORITIES:

- Last year there was an increase in dwelling burglaries during summer months — as a result we are conducting a burglary campaign, targeting offenders, liaising with neighbouring forces and providing crime prevention advice to residents.
- ii. Motorists are regularly breaking the speed limit on Leicester Road, Uppingham. Specifically during the morning and evening 'rush hour' period as a result over the last month we have continued with speed monitoring on Leicester Road and dealt with any offending motorists by means of advice, educational courses or prosecution where they are a repeat offender. Data from the black box deployed from 11/4/16-18/4/16 showed an average speed of 36 mph for approaching vehicles entering the 30 mph zone. This information has been discussed at the partnership meeting and forwarded to highways to look into. The Uppingham Neighbourhood Team will continue with speed monitoring throughout the summer period.

UPPINGHAM LENT FAIR

Uppingham Town Council has received a letter from a member of the community and representation from the business community asking the town council to consider the relocation of the annual fair to another site in town. The one alternative location under the control of the Town Council is Tod's Piece and this may be an option to consider. No other locations have been proposed or suggested so far.

Please remember this is not a survey about the merits of staging a fair as it enjoys 'Charter' status in the town; merely where it is located for the benefit of the town and those running the fair.

The current family that run the fair have operated it in the Market Place for more than 100 years and are aware of the consultation we are undertaking with the community. Uppingham Town Council are keen to get as many views as possible and in particular thoughts and comments from those residents and groups that may be impacted around the existing site in Market Place and Tod's Piece if a move were to take place. To understand feedback received we have asked you to indicate where you live in relation to the fair's current and potential location.

ASSET OF COMMUNITY VALUE

The Royal Oak, Queen Street, Uppingham, Rutland.

In April 2016 Uppingham Town Council resolved to explore the potential listing of the Royal Oak as an asset of community value. This would be done after a period of community consultation as this was the first time the council had sought to use such powers contained in Part 5 chapter 3 of the Localism Act 2011. The town council would join forces with CAMRA Rutland who are looking to protect and safeguard public houses across the UK from changes of use and/or redevelopment as housing.

The final step post consultation would be to make a recommendation back to the town council how to progress the initiative, if recommended a submission would be made to Rutland County Council as they are responsible for maintaining a register of community assets. Consultation with the community of Uppingham will take place over a two month window commencing 1st July 2016.
